The potato industry grew up with Idaho. Pioneers laid the foundation for the modern potato industry in Idaho. A century ago, when they constructed the first system of irrigation canals, they made the desert bloom.

Some of the best growing conditions are found in this region of the country. Scientists consider this an "optimum growing region" due to consistent warm days and cool nights, rich volcanic soil and plentiful irrigation supplied by the mountain snows and the Snake River Aquifer.

Idaho produces more potatoes than any other state, and that adds up to about 30% of the nation's total production. In Bingham County alone over 20 million 100-pound sacks are harvested every year, making this the "Potato Capital of the World".

HUCKLEBERRY GOLD

In 2016 over 87,341 service hours were invested back into our communities through Eagle Scout Service projects. These projects saved local communities over \$1,572,138 in man hours. The Grand Teton Council is proud of the 527 Boy Scouts who earned the rank of Eagle Scout this year.



COMMUNITY SERVICE



The Council's Scouting for Food Drive was a success as over 9,128 volunteers collected a total of 410,000 food items throughout their communities. These items were distributed to food banks throughout southeastern Idaho to help feed the over 50,000 families who are in need of food.

In addition to Eagle Scout service projects over 3,422 hrs. of community service were performed by Scouts who followed the Scout slogan of "Do a Good Turn Daily".

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MEMBERSHIP

Scouting sees the potential in all youth! The Grand Teton Council with the help of over 11,963 adult volunteers provides youth with Scouting opportunities that develop character, values, faith, commitment, resolve and the necessary skills they need for life. CUB SCOUTS 7,519 YOUTH • 506 PACKS

Cub Scouting is a family-centered program for boys in kindergarten through fifth grade. This program capitalizes on a boy's natural interest and curiosity to develop self-esteem and teaches cooperation, values, and family unity.



BOY SCOUTS 6,656 YOUTH • 501 TROOPS

Boy Scouting is a program for boys ages 11 through 17 that focuses on outdoor experiences and developing youth into leaders. Youth peers lead each other with adult guidance in order to develop character, leadership, and personal fitness in youth-led programs.



VARSITY SCOUTS 4,032 YOUTH • 451 TEAMS

Varsity Scouting is a program for young men who are at least 14 years of age but not yet 18. It provides options for young men who are looking for rugged, high adventure or challenging sporting activities and still want to be part of a Scouting program.



VENTURING 4,627 YOUTH • 461 CREWS

Venturing provides fun and inspiring program opportunities for both young men and women, ages 14 to 20. To make ethical choices through high adventure activities and a challenging advancement program.

EXPLORING 210 YOUTH • 17 POSTS



Exploring is a worksite-based program for young men and women ages 14 to 20 that gives youth an opportunity to visit community organizations and explore the dynamics of various careers.

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CAMPING

The Grand Teton Council provides some of the best camping opportunities for our youth. In 2016 the council held a unique council-wide overnight camping experience, a "Jamboral" which celebrated God's creations recognizing the 100th anniversary of the National Parks System in America.

This event held at Camp Stolworthy in Firth, ID had over 3,000 people in attendance who participated in a variety of activities. A highlight of the event was the arena show where Scouts were entertained by acclaimed musical artist – Alex Boye.

In addition, a new camp for Cub Scouts was introduced in the Pocatello area – Portneuf Springs Day Camp to serve the youth in the southern parts of our council.

Council camps provide an outdoor laboratory for youth to safely explore and learn by doing. During their time at camp youth have the opportunity to develop lasting friendships and practice Scouting values in a real world environment.


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

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

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POTATO RECIPES

CREAMY DILL POTATO SALAD

Recipe by Spend with Pennies

INGREDIENTS

- 3lbs white or red potatoes, unpeeled and cut into bite sized pieces
 11/2c diced celery
 - 3tbsp finely sliced green onion
 - ¾c mayonnaise
 - ¹/₂c sour cream
 - 2tbsp lemon juice
 - 4tbsp fresh dill, minced
 - 1tbsp dijon mustard

DIRECTIONS

Cut the potatoes and chop into bite sized. Boil the potatoes until tender (approx. 15-20 minutes). Cool and cut into bite sized pieces. In a large bowl, mix all ingredients except the potatoes. Combine cooled potatoes with dill mixture and refrigerate at least one hour.



TWICE - BAKED POTATO CASSEROLE

INGREDIENTS

Recipe by Taste of Home

- 1-1/2lbs red potatoes (6 medium), baked
 1/4tsp salt
 - 1/4tsp salt
 1/4tsp pepper
- 1lb sliced bacon, cooked and crumbled
 3c (24oz) sour cream
 - 2c (8oz) shredded mozzarella cheese
 - 2c (8oz) shredded cheddar cheese
 - 2 green onions, sliced

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350°. Cut baked potatoes into 1-in. cubes. Place half in a greased 13x9-in. baking dish. Sprinkle with half of the salt, pepper and bacon. Top with half of the sour cream and cheeses. Repeat layers. Bake, uncovered, 20-25 minutes or until cheeses are melted. Sprinkle with onions. 6-8 servings.

JALAPEÑO POPPERS

Recipe by Idahoan Foods LLC

INGREDIENTS

- 1 4oz package Idahoan[®] Four Cheese Mashed Potatoes
 - 16 fresh jalapeños
 - 32 slices of bacon

DIRECTIONS

Prepare mashed potatoes following package directions, set aside to cool. Split jalapeños lengthwise and remove the seeds and membrane. Stuff with 2 tbsp of the mashed potatoes and wrap with a bacon slice. Broil until bacon is slightly crisp.
